

In 1981, the United States Department of Defense (DoD) published a report titled "Defense Industry Initiative on Business Process Reengineering: Improving the Acquisition Process." The report was part of an effort to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the DoD's procurement process.

The report identified a number of problems with the acquisition process, including excessive bureaucracy, lengthy contract negotiations, and insufficient competition.
